## **Tribute to Margaret Watkins**

# Latest Blue Plaque: Janey & Christopher Ironside by Virginia Ironside

The latest Leamington Blue Plaque was unveiled in March 2023 was for Christopher, a Camouflage Officer, and Janey Ironside, a Professor of Fashion, who lived at 11 Lansdowne Circus during the Second Word War.





At the time, Leamington was full of artists involved in this specialised war effort contribution. The Camouflage Unit existed at the Leamington Ice Rink

(Victoria Colonnade/Loft Theatre).

It was converted into a giant studio, housing models of vulnerable factories, aerodromes, and housing estates. The idea was to disguise them from enemy bombers by using netting, paint, and false scenery so that they looked like rivers, farmland covered in sheep or innocent forests.



By constructing a false sun, moon, and clouds, even the weather conditions were reproduced so that the disguises would look authentic at different times of day and in different weather conditions.

### **Delivering Newspapers for W H Smith**

My friend Chris advised me that he was leaving WHS and did I want a job! I accepted this. The hours were 7 -8 a.m. Monday to Saturday and the Education Committee issued a card stating when I could work!

Chris was with me on my first morning. We went to the WHS back entrance, in Lower Bedford Street, where a man sorted the papers into rounds and addresses. Chris collected the papers into a heavy canvas bag with the WHS logo and we were off! I was paid 7s 6d per week - extra for evenings!

The Central Leamington Round covered: Hazel Smith, Regent St, Woodwards, Midland Bank, Cadena Café, Town Hall, Barclays Banks, National Provincial Bank, Wallhead, John Staite, Euston Place, 32 Hamilton Terrace, Jephson Villa, Health Office and 2 Regent Grove. Up to you to guess which papers each had!

We then cycled home! Next day I was on my own, with some extra Courier papers. I also delivered some evening papers to Clarendon Hotel, Regent Grove, Pump Rooms, Public Library, and the Bedford Inn.

During some heavy snow, I was the only paper boy who turned up for delivery – and one customer did complain that the papers were late! I can't recall if I ever had any tips at Christmas!

#### **Archive Antics**

It's like a reoccurring nightmare. Deadline day has arrived but fortunately I have something for you. Not entirely about Royal Leamington Spa but there are connections. I was aimlessly wandering through the Archive. Sorry, that is supposed to read, studiously studying the Archive, when I came across Hampton on the Hill and Grove Park, and a fine house it looks or rather looked. Now the Archive is very sparse as far as information against photographs is concerned and not being familiar with this particular homestead, I asked the learned Margaret Rushton what she knew. Well of course, says M, it was the home to Lord Dormer as in Dormer School, Dormer Place, and any other Dormer you can think of.

I, of course, was none the wiser, and so I dived into the Internet. Well, there had been loads of them starting with Robert, Baron Dormer of Wyng. (It's alright I'm not going to blind you with history). Now, Robert was made Baron in 1651, with a succession up to the present William Robert Dormer, 18<sup>th</sup> Baron Dormer.

Then, through my delving into the internet, I located the picture on the left which is Grove Park in May 1633. That's 1633 BC, that's **B**efore **C**ameras!



Right, so we have the place, we have the family, and we have some photos. But where is this, Grove Park? Well, it's in the Budbrooke area but on the outskirts of Hampton on the Hill. There is still a Grove Park House, the real one in the photos, below, was demolished in 1976. It was not just a 2 up, 2 down either.



There must be further information hidden away that I haven't found yet as to its actual size and number of rooms. As with a lot of these type of homes, use during

WW2, death duties, death watch beetles, death in the family and any number of financial factors meant that we lost to the nation over 5,000 substantial buildings such as this one.

I haven't had a chance travel up the track all the way to where the house used to be to see what's left but under the cover of a walker (training currently taking place!) I will be able to walk all the way along on either public footpaths or bridle ways. Also, in the grounds down where the house used to be there is the ruins of a Roman Fort. It gets even more intriguing.


Then! My good friends have just moved into a Bungalow at the entrance to Grove Park. Maybe they can pretend to walk their dog and find out more.



A week later they returned with news that there is a Monument, to what, they know not, and here's the photos. The Monument is located in Whitehill Wood and the only inscription on it was one that stated that it had been restored in 1989, appearing on maps around 1900.

Then, a breakthrough came when one of my friends' relatives produced a map with a handwritten note. Miss Dormer, KILLED by a HIGHWAYMAN? Whatever next? Whose daughter was she and what was her name? When did it happen? What happened to the

Highwayman? Did they know the Highwayman's name? All these things raced around my mind for minutes until I calmed down and delved once more into the Internet.



Aha! The 18<sup>th</sup> Baron Dormer was born in 1960 and as there is no death date, he must still be alive. A further delve produced an address down in Kent - not Grove Park. So, in for a Penny in for £1.10 of First-Class stamp, I fired a letter off to the Right Honourable, the Lord Dormer asking if he had any info on this sad event so that we can add it to our web site.

Gosh! Is that the time? Well, you'll have to wait till next month to hear the answers to my letter which may be a returned envelope.
