Leamington Blue Plaques

Everyone is invited to the unveilings of the next two Blue Plaques, to take place on Wednesday 23rd March.

One, in Bath Street will be for the legendary Mrs Fowler, O.B.E., who worked all her life for the Red Cross and many other charities.



The second, on a house in St Mary's Crescent will be for Miss Eleanor Doorly, a distinguished scholar and author, former pupil of Leamington High School (now Kingsley), and for

twenty years, Head Mistress of King's High School.

Later in the year, there will be a Special Interest Plaque at the Regent Hotel, and possibly a further Blue Plaque, for the chief designer of Jaguar cars, William Munger Heynes. LHG regularly contributes to the town's Blue Plaques.



Queen Victoria's Leamington Visit 1858

In 1858 Royal Leamington Spa was graced with a visit by Queen Victoria on 16th June. I came across an unexpected aspect of this visit whilst looking into the history of the builders of the town.

Two of the builders had built stands for the local people to have an optimum view of the monarch and her entourage. William Ballard built a stand for 1,500 people in Kenilworth Road and T Mason built another for 1,200 people near Trinity Church. It was reassuring to read that these structures were independently inspected to ensure that they were safe.

On a similar theme, seven builders, William Brown, Buddle & Son, Edward Clarke, John Barnwell, John Toone, Edward Treadgold and William Watkin provided tables for a celebration of Princess Victoria's birthday in 1837.
